

GENERAL MATTERS IN TEHAMA.—We notice the following local items in the *Red Bluff Beacon*, of June 25th :

Dr. Inskeep writes us that he has just returned from a trapping expedition beyond Lassen Butte, and that all the tribes he passed through expressed a determination to combine and give the whites a general battle. He also says the roads near the Buttes are watched by a large band of warlike Noser Indians.

A native of some one of the German States named Adam Numerich, about 25 years of age, and lately from Jacksonville, Oregon, was drowned in the river while bathing, on Sunday morning, at the upper landing. A certificate of deposit, given by Pierce, Church & Co., for 24 3-16 oz. gold dust was found in the pockets of his clothes on shore. An inquest was held by Coroner Bettis, and a verdict rendered in accordance with the above.

Quite an altercation took place between W. H. Abell and C. Roundtree, on Sunday afternoon, in which both were somewhat injured. Roundtree was cut in several places, while his wife, with true womanly spirit, dealt his antagonist a heavy blow on the head with some heavy instrument that left its mark. They will both recover.

Lieut. Davis arrived on the steamer Pike, on Monday, with a detachment of forty infantry soldiers, bound for Fort Crook. He left with his command for his place of destination immediately on the arrival of the boat.

One of the soldiers on board the Pike died on Saturday night, just before the boat reached Colusa, at which place he was left for burial. He was an old man, and had been in the service twelve years. He died very suddenly.

Capt. Timeworthy started up the river, yesterday morning, with the little steamer *Anna*, with a view of testing the possibility of navigating the Sacramento above this point, and if it is found that it can be done, to ascertain whether it is likely to prove sufficiently remunerative to justify its continuance. The success of the enterprise will be looked to with considerable interest.

The company sent against the Indians by subscription, has been up Duer and Mill Creeks, without finding any Indians or Indian tracks; they will now proceed in the direction of Antelope. Mr. Breckenridge came in, on Sunday, to Thomas & Bridges' place for provisions, and brought in a sick man. He thinks they will yet succeed in finding and punishing the enemy before the Summer is out.
