NEVADA DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION.

Resolved, That in the death of Stephen A. Douglas, our party has lost its worthiest leader and our country its foremost statesman.

The President announced that nominations for District Judge were next in order, and the names of J. I. Caldwell, John R. McConnell and M. F. Hoyt were placed before the Convention.

On motion the committee was also instructed to report the order of business.

On motion of Mr. Chase, a committee of eight, was appointed by the several townships, on resolutions, on Nevada—Thos. P. O'Connor, Rough & Ready—H. C. Roberts, Bridgeport—Thos. T. Price, Bloomfield—G. K. Reed, Eureka—A. B. Dibble, Little York—J. E. Squire.

On motion, the Convention adjourned until one o'clock P. M.

Afternoon Session.
On the re-assembling of the Convention, Mr. Fowler, from the Committee on credentials, reported the list of Delegates, which was approved.

Mr. Rolfe, from the Committee on Permanent Organization, reported the following officers:
President—A. B. Dibble,
Vice-Presidents—Joseph Gardner, Wm. Hill,
Secretaries—L. H. Fowler, M. H. Funston.

The report was received and adopted, and the permanent President, being conducted to his seat, addressed the Convention, and returned his thanks for the honor conferred upon him.

Mr. Rolfe, from the Committee, reported the

On motion, the roll of Bridgeport, Bloomfield and Eureka townships, comprising the 3d District, was called, and Dr. Walters having a majority, was declared the nominee for Supervisor.

Mr. Wait moved that a committee of three be appointed by the chair, to appoint the delegates to the State Convention among the several townships. Carried.

On motion, the convention took a recess of fifteen minutes, to enable the several delegates to report to delegates to the State Convention, and to select three persons from each township to act as a County Central Committee.
