
NEW RIVER.—We are glad to learn that this rich, extensive, and as yet only partially prospected mining section is again filling up with people. The Indians of that region have, with three or four exceptions, been killed or captured, and the miners feel that there is no danger in returning to their claims. Mr. Kirkham tells us that twenty-five miners are already at work, and that a large number more will be added before winter. The Flowers brothers and several others who were driven over into Klamath last Fall have returned and commenced work. There is little doubt but New River is to-day one of the richest mining localities in the State.
