Wednesday, July 1st, says:

A number of Yuba Indians which had recently been taken to the Nome Lackee Reservation by Captain Dobbin, who had made them promises that could not be fulfilled, (and thereby causing dissatisfaction among them,) left their quarters and came to Tehama, on their way to their old hunting grounds and homes. Col. Stevenson, the Agent, soon came up with them, and had them safely guarded for the night, when S. P. Storms, Agent of Nome Cult Reservation, joined him, and as S. P. Storms is well acquainted with the language and character of the Indians, no difficulty was had in inducing them to return with him to the Reservation. The Yuba's will be removed to S. P. Storms' Reservation, which is more remote, and consequently more safe for keeping these uneasy tribes.
