As most of the Hoopas are in the mountains, it would be well for him to postpone the pow-wow for a few days and send Capt. Ousley out after them. No doubt the diggers would be glad to see Mr. Hanson, particularly if he comes well supplied with blankets and provisions.

They have killed four, and made some valuable discoveries as to Indian whereabouts. On the mountain at the head of Pilot Creek, the diggers have about eighty head of cattle which they herd and butcher at their leisure. The cattle bear various brands—some branded M, and others O, C, F, B, V, etc. Some are ear marked with crop off both ears and under-bit in the left, and others not marked at all.

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
