

Hoopa Reservation.

The following is the Act of Congress appropriating money for the payment of the settlers in Hoopa Valley for their improvements, taken for Reservation purposes, which we publish for the information of our readers:

An Act to amend An Act entitled "An Act to provide for the better organization of Indian affairs in California." (Public, 100.)

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled:

That the sum of Sixty Thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be, and the same is hereby appropriated, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the purpose of enabling the Secretary of the Interior to pay the settlers in Hoopa Valley, California, for their improvements on the Indian Reservation therein. *Provided*, That before the same, or any part of the money hereby appropriated shall be paid, the said improvements shall be appraised by the Superintendent of Indian Affairs, the Indian Agent of said Reservation, and the Surveyor General of California; and if in the opinion of the Secretary of the Interior, their appraisal shall be reasonable, and shall not in the aggregate exceed the sum herein appropriated, the said Secretary is hereby authorized to apply the same or so much thereof as may be necessary, in payment of the said improvements, taking the proper releases therefor; *And provided further*, That the moneys hereby appropriated be reimbursed from the proceeds of the sales of Indian Reservations in said State under the provisions of the Act to provide for the better organization of Indian Affairs in California; approved April 8th, 1864.
