

U. S. ARMY MOVEMENTS.—A portion of Capt. Underwood's command has been removed from Hoopa Valley, and is at present encamped at Pardee's old house, on Redwood. They are under command of Lieut. Collins, and are within about one day's march of Capt. Lovell's command, in the Yager Creek country. We think the steps are being taken now by the U. S. troops to keep the Indians in check, and we have reason to hope they will do so.—*Humboldt Times*.

INDIAN TROUBLES.—We learn from Clark, who came up from Mattole this week, that the Indians at Kush-Kish, about twelve miles below Mattole, are becoming hostile. They fired a shower of arrows at Cunningham, a farmer in Mattole, while passing through their country, and shot his horse. A hunter was afterwards attacked by an Indian in that vicinity. The Indian made an effort to snatch his gun from him, but did not succeed, and was killed by the white man.—*Ib.*, July 7th.
