

ENUMERATING INDIANS.—By the revenue law passed last winter a capitation tax is laid on male Indians over, twenty-one years of age, of fifty cents each. Indians taxed by the constitution of the United States, are included in the population upon which representation in Congress is based.

Our census Marshal, Mr. Espie, has so far omitted to enumerate the Indians in this county and he informs us that, according to his instructions, he does not feel authorized to do so. If this is the case there must be something wrong about his instructions. The Constitution of the United States is the paramount law, and that instrument provides for the "actual enumeration" of all persons, whether white, black, or copper-colored upon which representation is based—the manner of making this enumeration only is left to be provided for.

Aside from its bearing on our future Congressional representation, it would be well, as far as possible, to have a census of the Indians in this section—in fact throughout the State. It would supply us with data as to their actual number and strength much more satisfactory than mere conjecture—which is all that we now have.
