

### Indian Troubles in Butte.

We learn from Wm. S. Long, Esq., who returned last Thursday from Cherokee Flat, Butte county, that Indian hostilities have again commenced in that section. On Tuesday last, three children of a man by the name of Lewis, living on Little Chico, were captured by a band of hostile Indians, while on their way home from school. The eldest was a boy of eleven, the next a girl of eight or nine, and the youngest a little boy of five or six. The oldest boy was shot in the neck with an arrow, and was probably killed. The little girl, a remarkably smart child, was a prisoner for over a day, but finally succeeded in escaping from her captors. She says that the Indians told her that her youngest brother had also been killed, and his body thrown over a precipice. The Indians who took her prisoner, killed a steer within two miles of Chico. When our informant left, the most intense excitement prevailed. Runners had been sent to every house from Feather river to the Sacramento valley, to inform the inhabitants of the danger surrounding them. The Oroville Guards had been called out, and had arrived at the scene of the trouble. It was supposed when Col. Long left, that the father and mother of the children spoken of had been murdered.

We also learn from the papers, that on Sunday last, two men, Jack Hayes and John Stommer, were wounded, and Tuesday Richard Morrison was killed. Citizens of Dogtown are trying to raise volunteers to drive the Indians out of that vicinity.
