

**INDIANS RETURNING.**—It is reported that a few of the Indians which were removed to the Klamath Reservation a few months ago have been seen about their old haunts in this county. If this be true, and it probably is, it is an experiment they are trying which they should be taught cannot be repeated with impunity. Give them the least encouragement that some of the favorites—only a few—can pass back and forth between the reservation and their old homes, and before our citizens are aware of it the majority of the whole lot of Indians that were taken away, and that we were so anxious to be rid of, will be located in our midst. This can easily be prevented if our citizens will but make good their promises to Indian Agent Buel, at the time he was here, "that the Indians would not be permitted to return and live in this county." The same thing was said to the Indians, and they perfectly understood it at the time they left for the Klamath. This is a matter of importance and our citizens should constantly be on the alert to see that the Indians do not again obtain a foothold in the settlements.

There is yet another thing which is practiced to some extent that ought at once to be stopped. We allude to the visits of the coast Indians, living between here and the Klamath, to some portions of the county. These Indians are in constant communication with those that formerly lived here; they visit for no good, but merely as spies, to see if the others may return with safety; their presence ought not to be tolerated. We are now well rid of the whole miserable crew that once lived along the coast and about our settlements, and it will be our own fault if we are annoyed by them in the future.
