~~that way in search of the same band of~~
~~Indians that Lieut. Geer had previously~~
~~come upon. Here the two commands~~
~~were united, and, in command of Capt.~~
~~Ousley, followed the Indians, who had~~
~~started toward the head of Grouse creek,~~
~~leaving a broad trail, which was easily~~
~~followed. The pursuing party is com-~~
~~posed of fifty men, and there is scarcely~~
~~a doubt but they have overtaken the In-~~
~~dians before this.~~

~~Sergt. Sevier returned to Fort Baker~~
~~with ten or twelve men who were una-~~
~~ble to proceed with the party. On their~~
~~way back, near the place where Lieut.~~
~~Geer first found the band, they came~~
~~upon an Indian spy, on duty. They~~
~~managed to creep on to and kill him.~~
~~He was a large Indian, well dressed, and~~
~~armed with a fine rifle and plenty of am-~~
~~munition, which they brought into camp.~~
