

INDIAN OUTBREAK ON PITT RIVER.—The Yreka Journal has intelligence that two weeks ago a party of nineteen men from Rouge river valley with 850 head of beef-cattle, on their way to Washoe, via Pitt river, were attacked, while going down the latter named river when a short distance above Fort Crooks, by 125 Pa-ute Indians, who killed two of the men, Mr. Evans and Joseph Bailey, and wounded two others, and took possession of all the stock. The men who escaped went to the Fort and returned with the soldiers stationed there. Lieut. Pfluger recovered 170 head of cattle. His party only saw seven Indians, of whom they killed two and wounded two. Lieut. Pfluger was shot twice, once in the arm and once in the breast. The Journal further learns that the settlers of Pitt river valley have determined to commence a war of extermination against the Indians, which that paper approves in strong terms.
