

INDIAN TROUBLES IN TRINITY.—The following very singular dispatches appear in the *Alta* of the 14th. We cannot imagine how such a band of armed Indians could reach that point without being discovered. Neither does their having a war dance look much like their manner of proceeding when they anticipate making an attack. We think there is a large "mice" somewhere, but as we will have more news to-day we simply give the dispatches:

WEAVERVILLE, Aug. 13.—A gentleman just from Douglas City, 7 miles from this place; brings intelligence that about 300 Indians, well armed, are having a war dance, and threaten to burn the place.

[SECOND DISPATCH.]
A messenger has just arrived from Douglas City, with a letter to Sheriff Jones, signed by 30 citizens of that place asking assistance, stating that Indians to the number of 300, from Big Flat, Klamath and Hiampaum, are holding a grand council of war—having sent all their squaws and children away—are well armed, and meditate mischief. A volunteer company is being organized at this place (Weaverville), and will proceed to Douglas City at once.

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
