To-morrow there will be 90 more here, who ran away from the Mendocino Reservation to keep from starving to death. We should like to see Mr. Hanson up this way, and take charge of these Indians. If he will only remove them to some point where they cannot find their way back to this county, he is welcome either to apply the "golden rule," a keg of powder, or any thing he pleases, so he will remove them far from us. What few soldiers we have here can better employ their time in fighting and catching Indians than in taking care of them, particularly when we have a special arm of the Government for that purpose.
