

CALIFORNIA WAR DEBT.—The California Indian War debt matters have all been definitely adjusted and settled by the 2d Auditor. The total amount claimed by the State was \$448,000. The total awards amount to about 229,000—the claims being settled upon the same basis as was applied in the Oregon War Debt case. Of the whole amount awarded, the State of California gets \$75,000 for the claims amounting to about \$140,000 which she has already assumed and paid. Of course the State loses the difference between those two sums. The balance of the claimants, who received bonds from the State to be paid whenever the General Government should pay the State, will only get their pro rata of what is paid to the State on account of their claims. The whole fund, however, goes through the hands of the State Government.
