

HAD HIS THROAT CUT.—A fellow by the name of John Mann, known as "Buck skin Jack," says the Humboldt *Times*, had his throat cut at Mattole Valley, in this county, one night last week, by a squaw with whom he had been living. It appears that Jack had been out on an Indian hunt, and had killed the brother of his squaw, bringing in the Indian's bow and quiver. The property was recognized by the squaw, and she determined upon avenging the death of her brother. After Jack had fallen asleep, she took a large knife and cut his throat, not however, severing the jugular vein. This had the effect to disturb Jack's repose; when he arose and seized the knife and killed the squaw on the spot. In wresting the knife from the squaw he had his hand severely cut.
