

HOOPA VALLEY RESERVATION.—As will be seen by advertisement elsewhere, Austin Wiley, Indian Superintendent for this State, gives notice that Hoopa Valley will be set apart for an Indian Reservation. Mr. Wiley has made a treaty with all the Indian tribes which have taken part in the late war upon the whites in this and Humboldt counties, and they have complied with the terms of the treaty by giving up their arms. All or nearly all the Indians which have proved so troublesome during the past few years are now in the Valley. Lieut. Beckwith, of one of the companies of "Mountaineers," has been tendered the position of Reservation agent, which he will accept without doubt. He is spoken of as an excellent man for the position. Mr. Wiley writes that some very fine fire-arms have been received from the Indians.
