

INDIAN TROUBLES IN TRINITY.—A dispatch dated at Weaverville, August 15th,

says:

About sixty volunteers who left here yesterday morning to attack a band of Indians who were threatening Douglas City, have returned. They surrounded the camp, supposed to be occupied by Indians, but they had evidently got wind of the affair just in time to make their escape. Quantities of provisions, bows, arrows, etc., were captured. The camp fires were still burning when the troops arrived. It is believed by some that the gathering of Indians was for the purpose of making war on the Cottonwood tribes, and not to burn Douglas City, as first reported. The Indians on New River, forty-five miles from here, have murdered two Chinamen. The white population all leave there to-morrow.
