couranx E.—A correspondent writing from Round Valley, Mendocino county, to the Democrat, speaks of Capt. Simpson and our Indian war in such a way as to convince people that he either knows very little of our Indian matters or does not care to correctly represent them. After speaking of a raid made on Round-Valley by a band of Wylackies, and the loss of some cattle, the writer says:

I am entirely at a loss to know why it is-that-Capt.-Simpson-is-not here-attend-ing to what I understand to be his businoss. I learn that he is assisting the northern companies to fight the Indians up there and drive them down this way, which I have no doubt is the cause of the Indians' being assembled in such numbers as they are here, and has caused them to make this raid into our valley. The people here are very much alarmed for the safety of themselves and property, on account of the fact that the Indians from all the country north of there have been rendered desperate by being driven from their own-country downthis way, and formidable by being col--lected-in-a-large body.

Capt. Simpson's "business" is to bbey orders, and he has no superiors in Round Valley to issue them. Some portion of his command has been scouting, or on escort duty since the company was organized, but we learn that it is the intention of Col. Whipple to send them in the direction of Mendocino county in a few days. As to the mountaineers in this county driving the Indians toward Mendocino county; the idea is too absurd to be worthy of notice.

Mountaineers

on men wanted to serve in the 1st Battal-Jour Mountaincors, Cal. Volunteers, until discharged. The service is special, and against the Indians-in-the Humboldt-Military. District.

Transportation, subsistence, clothing, blankets, etc. will be furnished the men as they are enrolled.

Volunteers will be entitled to \$100 Bounty from the U.S. Government, \$25 from Humboldt County. Monthly pay as allowed by army regulations, and five dollars per month additional pay by the State.

JFor further particulars enquire of the undersigned, who has been duly commissioned as Captain of Company D, First Battalion Mountaineers, and opened a recruiting office at the store of L Cullborg, at Areata, also at Fort Humboldt.
