One sound thrashing. for depre-1 dations committed, is worth more, in securing a lasting peace with these savages, than all the beef and 1 blankets that can be given them. Until within the * past few days, a commissioner would have been in great danger of losing his scalp, and especially his mule, if he had attempted to hant thein up to treat with them. They are now extremely anxious to derstand, recently suffered considerably for the want of food, which they are now desiring to be allowed to produce along the streams and valleys unmolested.
