

**DIGGERS MOURNING FOR A CHIEF.**—The Penn Valley Indians are mourning for the death of their chief, Capt. Lute, who died the fore part of last week. A grand sandango had been appointed, and the tribes around had been gathering, when the old man, who was sick, died, and the dance was turned into a burning. His body was burned on 14th September, in accordance with their funeral rites. The Indians feel his death keenly. He was the most respected of all the chiefs left them, since Welmar went to the Reservation. He was a man of good sense, a friend to the whites, and a well-disposed Indian, who exercised much influence in keeping the Indians within bounds of propriety. He rendered efficient service to the Agent in quieting the disturbances, last spring, between the Indians and whites.—*Nevada National.*
