Middleton and Foster, are now scouring the south-western border of this county in pursuit of the Indians who committed the late murder in Hay Fork Valley. The party of citizens who went in pursuit of them found one of their number dead near the South Fork. He had evidently been killed in a quarrel amongst themselves. On his person was found a sheath knife which had belonged to young Uessig. We have reason to believe that there will be a scarcity of Indians in this county before winter.
