

INDIAN OUTRAGES.—On Thursday of last week, some fifty or sixty Indians attacked the cabin of Mr. Bartim, commonly called "Old Red," in the Cottonwood country, and continued their assault for several hours, until they succeeded in firing it, and driving out the inmates, three in number, viz: "Old Red," Joseph Fusee, and Wm. Lux. The Indians commenced the attack in the morning, by firing on Wm. Lux, who was the first to go out of the cabin. It is supposed that not less than twenty-five rifles were discharged at him, and only one, fortunately for him, took effect in his right shoulder, inflicting a flesh wound, which was subsequently dressed by Dr. Sewell, of Horsetown. It appears extraordinary how the parties named escaped with their lives, so persistent was the attack made by the Indians. In the fight three of the Indians were killed, and the white men succeeded in making good their escape to Arbuckle, where they received protection.

A company of twenty men is at present in pursuit of the miscreants, whom it is hoped they will find and punish in the most summary manner.—*Shasta Courier.*
