

Second Trinity Volunteer Company.

We announced last week that Capt. Charles Stewart Brooks would open a recruiting office in Weaverville on Monday, the 30th ult.

Capt. Brooks had passed the necessary examination by the Military Board, and was recommended to Gov. Downey by order of Brigadier Gen. Sumner as in every respect capable to command a company of Infantry. He was thereupon instructed by the Governor to enlist a company and report to Col. H. M. Judah, commanding 4th Regiment of Infantry, California Volunteers, whose headquarters have been transferred from Placerville to Auburn.

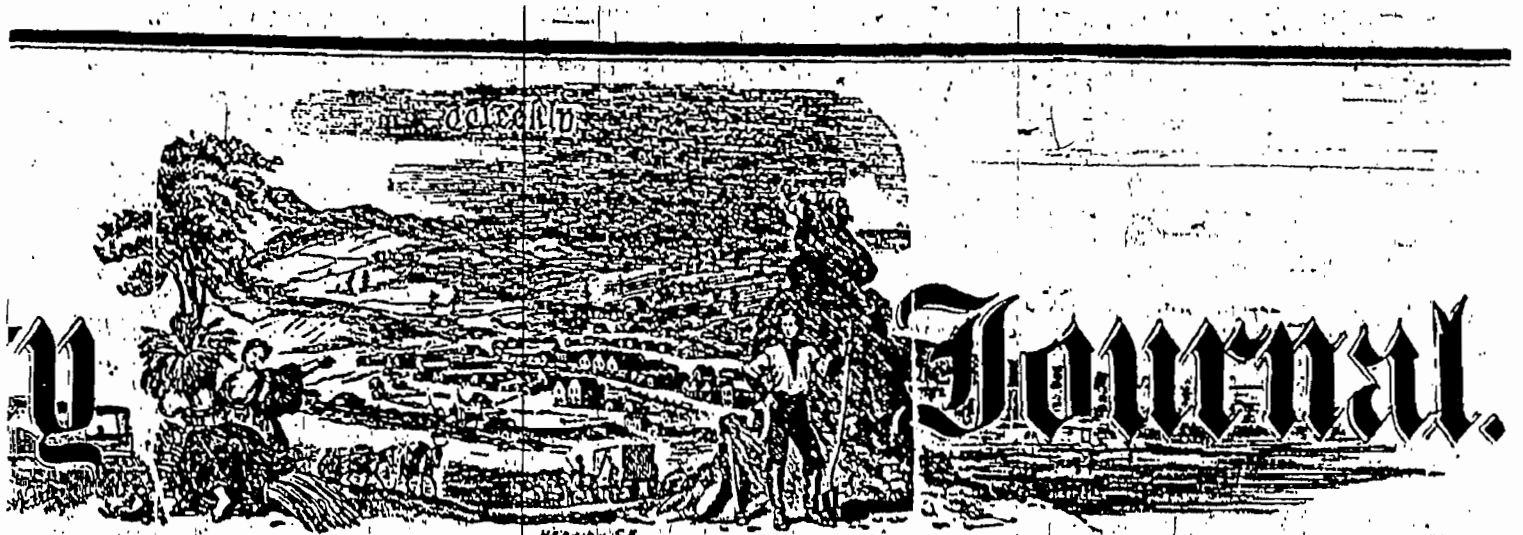
The office was opened at Cole's building, on Monday, since which time applications have been steadily coming in, and at the time of going to press the indications are that in a week or ten days, at farthest, the company will be full. Recruits are daily arriving from the neighboring towns where notice that a second company was forming has been received.

Capt. Brooks is advised by Col. Judah that his Regiment is fast filling up, in consequence of which he hopes to be ready to move from Weaverville by the 12th inst. The Captain has had the benefit of a thorough military education, and we have no hesitation in saying that the men who place themselves under his command will receive every possible favor and consideration at his hands.

The names enrolled thus far do credit to our county. The signatures are not those of men who go because they have nothing else to do; nearly all leave business positions because their country calls, and their services are required to aid in checking the rebellion which now threatens to overthrow the Government. They proclaim to the world that they are ready to share alike with citizens of other States the dangers and laurels to be gained in the battles about to be fought in defense of our common country, its institutions and homes.

The company should be full by this day week, and we trust that all citizens who design enlisting will report without delay. It is a matter of gratulation to us that our citizens have an opportunity to go under the leadership of so worthy a gentleman and patriot as Capt. Brooks, and that they are to enter the service under Col. Judah, who stands high in the estimation of military men and civilians in this State.

Fill up the company as speedily as possible, gentlemen, else another as favorable opportunity may not be offered you. The officers will be chosen soon as the requisite number of names are enrolled, of which due notice will be given.
