

The Indian Troubles in Shasta

Editors Appeal.—In your issue of this morning, the 12th inst., I notice that troubles of a serious nature exist between some of the citizens of Shasta County and the Indians in that vicinity, and that public meetings at Pine Grove and Parksville have adopted resolutions notifying the Indian Agent that if he does not, before the first day of November, next, remove the Indians between Chico and Pitt River, they will consider all such Indians as open foes, and treat them as such. I must say that I am truly sorry to see such feelings manifested. The matter would have been attended to long since, had it not been for the scarcity of funds. I not having received one dollar from the Government since I came into office. If the good people of Shasta County will exercise forbearance a short time, until means are furnished me by the Government, I promise them that the Indians shall all be taken to the Reservation, so far as it is possible for me to do so. I have now a special agent in that county endeavoring, so far as he can, without money, to gather up all the Indians and remove them to the Reservation.

By giving this a place in your valuable paper with a request that the *Red Bluff Beacon* and *Shasta Herald* copy the same, you will greatly oblige me, and perhaps prevent further hostilities.
