

**From the War.**

Capt. Werk paid our town a flying visit on Thursday. He looked hearty, and informed us that he was after 20 more men which he had orders to raise. This addition to his Company will nearly double his effective force in the field, as it takes a certain number of men to guard and do the necessary work, which they can as well do for 20 more as for those now in service.

The campaign against the Indians thus far, has not been so successful as he could wish; but his Company labor under great disadvantages on account of the dry warm weather. As soon a heavy rain falls it will extinguish the fires which at this time are raging over the whole Indian country; besides it will oblige the Indians to build isolated fires, which will betray their lurking places. It will be singular if we do not get rain soon; and then we shall expect to hear that the hostile savages are being severely chastised.

From Lieut. D. D. Lynn, of Fort Humboldt, who visited Capt. Lovell's Command last week, we learn that the detachment of volunteers under Lieut. Warren, had a brush with Indians on the 10th inst., on Larabee Creek. Two bucks were killed and eleven squaws and children taken prisoners. From the evidences found it was apparant that these were a portion of the gang by which the house of Mr. E. Loubaugh was recently robbed.
