

INDIANS TO BE REMOVED.—We learn from the Humboldt papers that the Superintendent of Indian Affairs having reported that he is prepared to receive at the Nome Cult Reservation the Indian prisoners now under guard at Fort Humboldt, the Commander of the District will, as soon as possible, send the Indians to the Reservation at Fort Wright. The tribes will go separately—the Trinity Indians last. They will be well guarded, and transportation furnished those who are sick or unable to travel. We hope the experiment of keeping these Indians at Nome Cult will be successful. The people are praying that another Indian campaign may not be necessary. They terribly dread a renewal of Indian troubles, and almost as badly the “red tape” *modus operandi* of subduing red skins. We, for one, beseech the Indians not to “break out” again.
