

MOVEMENT OF TROOPS.—The command under Capt. Underwood, is stationed at Purdee's old place on Redwood, and is still engaged in escorting trains across the mountains. A company of 80 men was organized at Big Bar, on the 14th inst., and elected I. G. Messic, of Weaver, Captain, and Mr. Winslet, of Burnt Ranch, 1st Lieut. They were to arrive at Capt. Underwood's camp on Monday of this week, and, after establishing a permanent camp some where in that vicinity, they will proceed at once against the Indians.

Gen. Kibbe was in Union on Monday last, and had started out two weeks supplies for the Volunteer Company. The Gen. will remain with them for a while, furnishing them with supplies, under his Commission as Adjutant-General of the State. The company is composed of good men, and with the officers they have selected we have every confidence they will put a stop to Indian depredations in that quarter. Success to them.
