

MEETING AT HYDESVILLE THIS EVENING.

Considerable interest is being manifested in the subject to be considered at the adjourned meeting to be held this evening at Hydesville:—the disposition to be made of the tame Indians of this county. The question is fraught with difficulty and requires to be handled dispassionately. The presence of adult male Indians in the community, either as vagrants or apprentices, is believed generally to be pernicious. In the opinion of a few, they are a convenience not easily dispensed with, but for the good of all parties, both whites and natives, they are willing to forego the convenience and consent to the removal of the latter to the reservations, to be protected and provided for by Government.

This course would seem to be prompted by every consideration of prudence and humanity. Granting it to be true—as is claimed by some of their mistaken friends—that the tame Indians do not give aid and comfort to the hostile bands in the mountains, all do not share that opinion, nor do all exercise a wise discretion in dealing out punishment for Indian depredations. The result is disastrous to the domestic Indians, as well as a fruitful source of trouble to the settlers. A philanthropic feeling for the ignorant natives and a desire for the peace of society are in favor of the removal of the Indians to the Reservations set apart for them.

We hope that prudent counsels will prevail at the meeting to-night, resulting in the adoption of some plan which will address itself to the propriety of each citizen of the county.
