The statement was not true. A gentleman connected with the Reservation informs the *Petaluma Journal* that the Indians who had returned to Russian river had done so by the permission of the Reservation officials, and that they would again return to the Reservation so soon as their permit had expired; and that, although there are now upwards of six thousand Indians at the Reserve, they all appear perfectly content and happy.
