

LETTER FROM SISKIYOU COUNTY.

Sheriff of Siskiyou County—IV. Oliver—Indian Murder on McCloud River—New Paper in Yreka—Quartz Discovery, &c.

FRENCH GULCH, Oct. 22d, 1859.

Editor Democrat:—Who is Sheriff of Siskiyou County? is the question of all-absorbing interest with us at present. Dr. F. C. Horsely was appointed by the Board of Supervisors, to fill out the unexpired term of S. P. Fair, absconded; that term expired on the first Monday in October.

At the election, Sept. 7th, Wm. Grow was elected to that office by a majority of over five hundred votes, and on the day appointed for the officers elect to take their respective stations, he appeared at the Court House, and was duly qualified; but when proceeding to enter upon the duties of the office, he demanded the books and papers appertaining thereto. Mr. Horsely refused to deliver them up, on the ground that Mr. Grow was ineligible to the office, he being post master at Yreka, at the time of his election; a federal office, the compensation of which exceeds five hundred dollars per annum, which is a violation of Sec. 21, Art. IV, Constitution of California. Mr. Grow forwarded his resignation as post master on the first of September, which act he considers releases him from the duties and responsibilities of that position, and has sued for possession of the one to which the people have elected him. ~~Mr. Horsely is still acting as Sheriff.~~

As to the merits of the above case, public opinion is divided. Mr. Horsely's friends consider his grounds of contest good, and hold that his retention of the office is just and proper. Mr. Grow's friends think there has been no violation of law, and that their favorite is entitled to the position—they consider him the victim of political enmity, and cry persecution. There is also a third party or class, who reason more coolly over the affair, than either of those mentioned, and whose opinions, free from prejudice consequent upon personal or political regard for the contesting parties, are entitled to notice. These, believe that Mr. H. has no right to continue in the office after the expiration of the term for which he was appointed; that there being no vacancy, (the Sheriff elect having qualified) and nothing more than a disqualification, the duties of the office pass to the charge of the Coroner; that functionary, however, having reached the goal of his ambition, and careless of claims to a higher office, not altogether groundless, looks on without putting in a word. The case goes to the Supreme Court, and taking its place regularly upon the docket, several months must elapse before it is decided, during the whole of which interim, the legal right of any incumbent, will most probably be a question, and an important one with us. The circumstances, require for it an earlier hearing, if possible, for until a decision is rendered, much confusion must prevail in the office, and doubt and uncertainty upon the part of the people will lessen the tax receipts, and likely engender litigation.

one of the early residents of Nevada county, and
may not be unknown to many of the readers of the
DEMOCRAT: He established, and for some time
edited the Grass Valley Telegraph. He has nearly
recovered from his injuries.

Information has just reached here, that a Mr.
Brewster, formerly a resident of this vicinity, has
been murdered by the Indians on McCloud river,
whither he had gone on a prospecting tour. Some
years since, he started up that stream on a similar
mission, but was driven back by the Indians, and
narrowly escaped with his life. On that excursion,
he obtained such flattering prospects as to lead him
to believe in the existence of rich and extensive
diggings on that stream, and he frequently expressed
his determination to return as soon as he was
able, and try his fortunes there once more, little
calculating, however, upon so speedy and unfortu-
nate termination of his hopes as has succeeded. It is
generally believed that that river and its branches,
are very rich in gold deposits, while it is well known
that they water some of the finest country on the
western slope of the Nevadas; but the hostility of
the Indians inhabiting that section, has prevented
its settlement. This state of things cannot last
much longer. An enterprising and wealth-seeking
population are crowding toward that region, and
though at the sacrifice of some lives, will ere long tap
the fountains of wealth, now so feloniously guarded
by those ignorant of their worth and application.

The Siskiyou Chronicle, that battled nobly in fa-
vor of Anti-Lecompton principles during the late
political campaign, and sank to rest with the defeat
of that party, is to be followed, (not in death) by a
sheet, entitled the Northern Journal, which will
make its advent about the first of November.

A company of three or four emigrants "travel-
stained" and penniless, arrived here from the plains
a few weeks since, and being unable to obtain work
by the day, set to prospecting for quartz, about two
miles from town, and almost before they knew it
themselves, they were owners of one of the richest
ledges ever struck in this section.

The Water Gir.—On the evening of October 1st, the city of Wilmington, Delaware, was lighted up with gas made from water, under the patent of Prof. Sanders, of Connecticut. The supply of coal was turned off, the water gas ran through the pipes, and Wilmington had a light which as brilliant, thrice as pure as any other known. The operation was observed by a large number of people. It is agreed that it was a decided success. It is a practical point of view, the question is thus stated: Coal gas costs in the western cities from \$2.25 to \$3.50 per 1000 cubic feet, while the water gas costs from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per 1000 cubic feet. The theory of Sanders' process is this: Water is decomposed by being passed over a bed of asbestos, and the resulting gases, hydrogen, carbonic oxide, and light carbureted hydrogen, are immediately lighted by gas. The decomposition of water or coal vapor, simultaneously with, and in the presence of, the decomposition of the vapor of water.
