

### Public Meeting.

At an adjourned meeting of the citizens of Humboldt county held at Hydesville, (in accordance with a call published on the 12th inst.) on Saturday evening the 26th day of October, Mr. W. T. Olmstead was chosen Chairman, and E. L. Davis, Sec. The meeting was called to order by the Chairman, who stated that the object of the meeting was to make some disposition of the Indians of our county.

On motion, the proceedings of the previous meeting were read.

On motion, W. T. Olmstead, R. M. Williams, A. P. Guthrie, P. J. Davis and Mr. Sumption of Arcata, (who had been appointed as a visiting committee previously,) were appointed as a committee to make such alterations in the Resolutions that were adopted at the last meeting as they might think best.

After a short absence the committee returned and reported as follows:

*1st. Resolved,* That persons in this county having Indians, be requested to allow them to be sent to the Reservation, and all such Indians remaining after 20 days from this date, unless under the immediate protection of a responsible white man, to be considered hostile and subject to be treated as such.

*2d. Resolved,* That all Indians, both pet and wild, that are gathered in, be sent to the Reservation immediately, and those that refuse to go within 20 days be treated as hostile.

On motion adopted, that there be means raised by private subscription to defray the expenses of collecting the Indians and sending them to the Reservation, and that a committee of two be appointed to collect the money to defray the expenses incurred and also to collect the Indians to a convenient place preparatory to removing them to the Reservation. The

*2d. Resolved,* That all Indians, both pet and wild, that are gathered in, be sent to the Reservation immediately, and those that refuse to go within 20 days be treated as hostile.

On motion adopted, that there be means raised by private subscription to defray the expenses of collecting the Indians and sending them to the Reservation, and that a committee of two be appointed to collect the money to defray the expenses incurred and also to collect the Indians to a convenient place preparatory to removing them to the Reservation. Cathay, Jas. Brown; Yager Creek, J. Reed, Col. Wood.

On motion, the meeting adjourned.
