civilized home.

The Aspect of the War. The Irish people through their organ, the "Dublin Nation," thus speak of the present aspect of the War in the Crimea. The Nation says the recent "victory" which has cost the lives of 200,000 men, and the blood of 500,000, is a military prestige, increased to an alarming extent, to judge public debt and literally made England a nation of orphans, as determined up as follows:

"The great victory" of Sebastopol has at length been admitted, and the terrible carnage of the month and of its fair and glorious actions vanish with its great rapidity. The map of blood-stained Africa for the first time they remember that which the Russians have probably long had in their hands. But the British and French have a few days more of their hands, and they are to accept of a satisfactory condition for all the blood and gold squandered during that terrible struggle. France, England, and Italy, in these for such magnificent results—she, who can scarcely advance a legitimate claim to participate in the feeble ray of glory won by the bravery of France! "Our august Ally," indeed, despatches a special message of congratulation to the brave British army—recognizes the "moral force" by which they have been habitually distinguished; but the independent journals of France, who have no occasion to conceal their contempt for the bold general and boy-soldier who have been a curse and impediment at every point of the campaign. Mark the intense scorn with which the "Assembly Nationale," for example describes the part taken by the British contingent in the recent assault: "The English attacked the Redan, but all their efforts failed before the artillery of the enemy, and they were not able to become masters of it. This time, at least the failure of their attack did not endanger the position of the British."

stage a company near Jamestown some five miles from Sonora, the Messrs.
