

FROM THE SEAT OF WAR.—Yesterday, afternoon we received two letters from the camp on Yager Creek, giving full particulars of the late skirmish there, of which a vague account is given in another column. One of the letters is from our young friend E. E. Turk, of this place, and the other from an unknown correspondent, signed "pro bono publico." The details are interesting and we very much regret that the late hour at which they were received precludes the possibility of their publication this week. In the skirmish on Yager Creek three ranches were stormed, five bucks killed, and five bucks and 21 women and children taken prisoners.— Among the bucks captured were some who were wounded in the last fight on Mad River, and they say that most of the Indians who have been engaged in the depredations on the Trinity trail are now on the head waters of Mad River, Yager Creek and Van Dusen's Fork. The correspondent informs us that there is no doubt but the Indians are in a position where escape will be impossible and that their capture is almost certain. He further says that the prisoners will be sent to Eureka or Union, where Col. Henley has promised to receive them, and provide for them on some Reservation.
