

INDIANS RETURNED.— All, or nearly all of the Indians which were removed from this county to the Klamath Reservation last spring, have returned or are on their way back. It is said, but we know not with what truth, that this is with the consent of the government officers who now have charge of that reservation. The reason assigned, common report says, for allowing the Indians to leave the reservation, is, that no adequate provision has been made for their subsistence. This should hardly be so, for only a little over a month since, Mr. Buel, then Indian Agent, informed us that there was an abundance of food for all the Indians on the reservation, including those taken from this county. All the Agent required at that time was, that when any of the Indians should escape from the reservation and return to their old homes, our citizens should make them understand that they could not under any circumstances remain here, but must immediately return to the home provided for them by Government. How it happens that there is such a scarcity of food at the Klamath now as to make it necessary that several hundred Indians should leave, we cannot imagine. There is a mistake somewhere. It is, however, certain that the Indians have come back, and the question to be determined now, is, whether we are to be cursed with their presence, or whether they can be provided for at the reservation where they belong. We forbear comment at this time, in the hope of soon hearing something reliable from the Klamath.
