Through Adams and Co's Express we are placed in the possession of the Nevada Journal of Thursday

We learn from it that the Indians at the back of the Sugar Loaf, have been doing mischief among themselves and the whites. The difficulty originated among the Yuba Indians, the chief of which tribe attempted on Sunday last to kill another Indian, who fled to a miner for protection. The chief, however, shot him twice with arrows and killed him. An arrow was shot into the cabin of a Mr. Poor, the same evening, which pierced his back between the shoulder-blades. The same night, also, several valuable horses belonging to Shepherd's ranch were shot with arrows, killing some and wounding others.

The Indians say that the reason of these transactions on their part, was a wish to embroil the Yuba tribe and the whites in a war.

A party of seventy men went on Tuesday in search of these Indians, swearing vengeance against the whole race, if the guilty parties are not given up.
