

ANOTHER FIGHT WITH INDIANS.—Our account in last issue of the battle in which Charley Huestia was killed, left a portion of Capt. Werk's Company of State Volunteers, with a number of citizens, in pursuit of the Indians engaged in that fight. The Indians were tracked to Redwood creek, and for some distance down that stream, when word was brought that there were two rancherias a mile or more below Minor & Saf's, in which were hostile Indians. The party was upon this, divided equally, and under the command of Lieuts. Wilkinson and Warren, proceeded on each side of the creek with the intention of making a simultaneous attack upon the villages. The Indians, on the side of the stream upon which was Lieut. Wilkinson with his command, were alarmed before the arrival of the white

men, and all escaped. The party with Warren made an attack which resulted in the death of fourteen Indians. One of the attacking party—Russell—was slightly wounded in the knee by a bullet. The same day two of the volunteers went a little way still further down the creek where they fell in with two Indians. At a signal agreed upon they fired at the Indians, killing one. The other took to his heels but was chased by James Brock, one of the whites, who fired two pistol shots at the digger, both of which took effect but did not stop him. Brock then caught him by the hair, calling to his comrade to shoot, which he did. The ball hit Brooks' hand, injuring three fingers, but also struck the Indian's cabesa. The Indian managed however to make his escape, though it was thought he could not recover.

Several of our citizen volunteers returned yesterday; the balance pushing on to Grouse creek, where it has long been known there are hostile Indians. If they are "at home" we may expect to hear of warm work.
