

INDIANS GATHERED.—There are now about eighty Indians gathered, which will be taken to the Klamath Reservation just as soon as the streams fall sufficient to permit travel. The intention first was to send them to Crescent City; thence by land to the Klamath. There is too much uncertainty in this, and the land trip has been determined on. Maj. Martin, as agent for the State, will furnish mules for the transportation of such as cannot walk. The citizens are advancing the necessary means to subsist the Indians, as they come in, until their removal can be accomplished.

There are some three hundred or four hundred Indians, we are credibly informed, disposed to submit to removal, and will come in as soon as they can be provided for. The agents of the Indian Department might do much this winter in this county toward closing the present border war.

THE BRODERICK WILL, and the State's Interest Therein.
 The Bulletin has the following on this subject:
 "The Broderick will has been probated, and was recently before the County Judge on a petition for sale of the property to pay the debts. While this proceeding was pending, it was stated in Court that the parties interested under the will who have purchased the interests of the legacy were somewhat impeded by the audacious appearance of certain heirs, who proposed contesting the validity of the will; and that by some means, not explained as yet, except upon the reasonable hypothesis of a compromise, the alleged heirs had ceased contesting the probate of the will. His lordship, in the present appearing to be going along in entire harmony, so that the genuineness of the will was not likely to be tested by any of the assumed blood relations of the late Senator. Under these circumstances, Mr. F. M. Tinker, Attorney General, six heavy balls was shot to represent the rights of the State of California in the premises. He asserted the strong probability that the will was a forgery. But the assumed heirs were in reality no heirs at all, or if they were so, had placed themselves outside the pale of the Court—see this week's paper—the *Chlorine Broderick estate* market, and a sketch of the State of California. In substantiating the rights of the State, it is now stated that there is in this city an affidavit, which, if true, the gentleman named, not only the forgery of the will in New York, but reveals the details of the manner in which the crime was committed, with names, dates, and corroborative facts. This affidavit is stated to have been made some time since by a Mr. Wilcox, clerk of the Superintendent of the Mint, he having received the appointment to that position through the influence of Col. A. J. Butler. This important witness is now temporarily absent in New York; presumed to be gathering additional testimony on the subject.

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
