

RESERVATION INDIANS.—It has been said, and told so often that many believe it, that the Indians had been nearly starved while at the Klamath Reservation and that those in command there were obliged to let them go to save them from perishing by hunger. To judge from their appearance they never had better times. As Henry Clay said to the impertinent abolitionist speaking of his negro slaves, they are "fat and sleek." We should like to hear from Mr. Terrill whether these Indians can have a home on the reservation and be provided for. Their presence here is sure to create a disturbance of some magnitude before very long, which can and should be prevented. It is intimated that measures are in contemplation to prevent their residence in this county, but we trust that our officers will act with discretion in the matter and await information from the chief who is in charge of the Klamath Reserve.
