Indian Outbreak at Klamath Reservation. The Crescent City Herald of the 2d justant, のないでいていていたのできる contains the following letter: -KLAMATH REAKEVATION, Nov. 23d, 1857. -For the past month, the Agent in charge has been aware of au attempt being made to unite the different tribes upon the river and Hoopa Valley, with the Indiaus who had been remared from the vicinity of Smith river, for the purpose of a grand outbreak, at the head of which was an Indian commonly known as Requa Mike." On the-10th- inst. Mike came to the Agent "and Lieut. Geo. Crook, and told them that the Talaws (as the Klamaths call them.) had laid a plan to murder the Agent and Lieutenant : that they said if they killed them, all the property would belong to them, and they could then go to the mountains; that they were to come up and ask the Agent for a talk, when he would take them into the house, they spring upon him, and the white men with him, with their knives, and cut their throats. At the same time _another party was to cross the river, and way-Jay-the Litentenant, when, as they supposed, his men would be easily whipped, as they would run to the brush. On Saturday, 11th inst., they attacked a small party of Klamaths, and wounded several, and on Sunday the Agent went to the village for the purpose of having them make -peace with the Klamaths, when he was immedi-- stely surrounded by some forty of the Tolaws - - in warrig, and to-extricate themselves were forced to send for the guard, when, after talking to them, he compelled them to go to their -homes, and the Klamaths to Wakell-station, at the same time telling them that if they attompted to fight, he would let the soldiers fire on both parties; that there must be no fighting amongst them; that he would protect one as much as the other : if Klamaths attacked the. Tolaws, he would fire upon the Klamaths, and he would do the same to the Tolaws, if they attacked the -Klamaths. On. Monday, 16th. the Agent succeeded in getting them to make peace and exchange a-laque chicek. . On Tuesday morning, 17th inst., an old squaw came to the station and told the Agent that the Yon tak-et more-e-ma was very sick and wanted to see him. In company with Mr. Goodspeed, he stanted for the village distant about falf a mile from the station, and had scarcely cutered - the house of the supposed sick man, when-Requa Mike stepped into the door, remarking: "llow do you, Major," and presented a yager to the breast of the Agent and fired, the muzzle - being within a few inches of his breast. The quickness of the Agent in turning it aside, as Mike pulled the trigger. was all that saved his life. The Agent and Mr. Goodspeed immediately seized Mikey when the Tolaws rushed upon them, and commenced to throw their arrows. A fight ensued, which the Agentiand Mr. Good-, speed sustained for at least lifteen minutes, nutilffelief arrived from the station, when the Indians word completely routed. with a loss of the hof their miniber killed.
