

INDIAN AFFAIRS.—The *Union* says that Captain Maltby, Superintendent of Indian Affairs in this State, has been on a visit to the Tule River Reservation, and expresses himself highly gratified with the manner in which things are conducted there. If half is true of the reports constantly being received from the Round Valley Reservation, things are not being conducted in a very satisfactory manner there. We are told that many of the Indians sent there from Humboldt and Klamath counties are on "leave of absence" in the mountains bordering the western part of this county. A visit from the Superintendent might not result in finding matters in as good shape at Round Valley as at Tule River. Nevertheless, we still hope to the contrary.
