OFFICE KLAMATH IND. RESERVATION,
November 24, 1860.

~~EDITORS Humboldt Times Gents:—~~

Knowing that you feel some interest in regard to the Indians that were removed from your county to this reservation in April last, and regret that they have again returned to their old homes, I take this opportunity of informing you in regard to the Indians from Mad and Eel river vicinity, who escaped from here a few days ago and are probably by this time again in your midst. These Indians, about two hundred and twenty-five in number—have remained here, apparently contented, ever since Col. Buel removed them, until a week ago, when three Indians came up from Eel river and told them that there were many "white men" who wished them to return, and said that they should not be molested, nor need not fear of being re-taken to the reservation. They also mentioned over several names of persons who desired them to return. Among them were Messrs. K—, J—, S—, R—, and others.

[We suppress the names, as we would not have suspicion rest upon any man on Indian testimony.—Ed. TIMES.]

This is Indian report and I do not wish to credit it; however, the Indians here believed it true, and immediately prepared to escape from the reservation, which object they all accomplished one night, with the exception of about thirty, who were seen in time and prevented from leaving. I did not attempt to follow those who succeeded in escaping, from the fact that I knew it would be useless to bring them back and try to keep them here with a force of three employees as long as they are enticed or even permitted to enter Humboldt county.

I have heard that it has been reported in said county that the Indians were leaving this reservation on account of there being no food here for their subsistence. If such is the report, it is utterly untrue, as there has been an abundant crop raised here during the past season, and there is now in store enough wheat, potatoes, peas, beans, &c., to have fed them well, provided they had remained, until another crop could be raised and harvested.
