

**DANGEROUS.**—L. Southwayd, in company with two other men, were out looking after stock one day last week, on Bear river, and came near being cut off by a band of Indians. The Indians, twenty in number, were divided in three parties, and had their plans well laid, but the whites knew the lay of the land well and succeeded in affecting their escape. They had no arms except revolvers.

Truly, we have fallen upon dangerous times. The Indians have entire possession of all the stock-ranges in the county save Bear river, and now they are concentrating their forces in that vicinity. What makes the matter still worse is that much of the stock on that range has been driven from other grazing grounds for safety. There was their last resort, and unless measures are speedily taken to the satisfaction of diggers, the last chance for stock raising in Humboldt county is gone.
