

### From Sacramento.

By private advices and late dates of papers from Sacramento City, we are informed of the alarming rise of water at that place, but the Mayor and corporation were diligently at work, and it is hoped that an overflow may be prevented by embankments which are being thrown up along the stream.

Many of the towns of the up river country were beginning to suffer from the swollen state of the streams, at last accounts. It is believed, however, that the flood has attained its highest stage, so we may expect the river to fall in a few days, quite as rapidly as it has risen.

A report prevailed in Sacramento of a rich discovery of gold near one of the new towns in the north. The settled conviction seemed to be, at last, that the story was a hoax, started for speculative purposes.

We take the following from the *Sacramento Transcript*:

*Difficulties with the Indians.*—The Rough and Ready Diggings are situated on Deer Creek, below the town of Nevada. The Indians in the vicinity have for some time back troubled the whites by stealing their cattle. The miners became more and more exasperated, and finally a party was formed, who went out in search of the depredators. The whites are also continually stealing cattle and mules on the road. The last news was a rumor that the thieves had been found, and that twenty-five of the Indians had been killed.

**DARING AND EXTENSIVE ROBBERY.**—The store of Messrs. Lovering & Hoogs, on Clay street near Montgomery, was entered on Saturday evening about nine o'clock. The proprietors, after having closed the establishment, stepped into the yard in the rear, being absent about fifteen minutes. On their return they found that the front door had been opened by the aid of false keys, and the entire lot of valuable articles therein abstracted. A few inferior watches were about all that remained to tell the tale. The robbers effected an outlet from the side door which was bolted. It is estimated that above \$5,000 worth of their fine stock of jewelry was taken, which will prove, even in this country, a severe loss to the young and enterprising men composing the firm. The robbers, we trust, displayed greater skill in committing the robbery than they will in escaping detection. A reward of \$500 is offered for the discovery of the perpetrators and conviction.
