SACRAMENTO INTELLIGENCE.

From the Upper Sacramento.—Mr. Freamer is now at "Redding's." He contemplates leaving there with the company of troops who are to start in a few days for Goose Lake to punish the Indians in that vicinity for the murder of Capt. Warner. He will meet the early immigration trains at Pitt's River, as they come in, and return with them. We learn that the Indians are very troublesome in the neighborhood of Redding's. They came down from the mountains a few days since and stole two horses. Mr. Freamer with eleven mounted men and forty Indians started out in quest of them. They were absent two days, discovered the ranche-ria, and charged upon it, killed four Indians, and brought away six prisoners. They found 6,000 lbs. dried beef, mining tools, and provisions of every kind, which had of course been stolen.

Everything is dull on the Upper Sacramento, and goods are reported as selling very low. But few ves-sels are running on the river, and most of the supplies are brought overland from Marysville. We may ex-pect the immigration to commence arriving about the 10th July.

Latest from China.

By an arrival from Hong Kong, yesterday, we received, at a very late hour last night, copies of the Friend of China as late as the 27th April. We are unable this morning to give even an abstract of the news by this ar-rival in time for our morning's edition.
