"LIBERALITY."—The Alta of yesterday morning comments sarcastically upon the liberality of Justice Brown in paying six dollars to a jury in a cause tried before him. The law, which should guide Justices as well as other people, prescribes that the party in whose favor a verdict is rendered shall pay to the Justice six dollars, *to be equally divided among the Jury*. This law, while it is most imperative, is at the same time most ridiculous, but is every way worthy of the Legislature of "a thousand drinks" which enacted it.

That Legislature displayed its wisdom in some other laws passed by it. The 6th section of the Act for the Government and Protection of the Indians, and the 6th section of the "Act concerning Roads and Highways," furnish luminous evidence of the clearness of the heads which fixed the compensation of a Juror in a Justice's Court at one dollar per day. NOT JUSTICE BROWN.

The paragraph alluded to in the above was not intended to reflect upon Justice Brown, but was a mere piece of *badinage* regarding the disposition of the enormous sum of \$6, which our reporter thought was *rather* funny.
