## SACRAMENTO INTELLIGENCE.

*The Cholera—Its Progress.*—Five or six cases only have been reported since our last issue. This indicates no increase, and encourages the hope that with the thorough precautionary measures now on foot, and the timely attention of everybody to the recommendations as to cleanliness, clothing and diet, the malady may not assume an epidemic character. We heard of but three deaths yesterday, and they, as well as all previous ones, occurred in cases of neglected diarrhea, or under circumstances which rendered the victim peculiarly liable to an attack. The hospital provided for the cure of patients at the city charge, is a most convenient and suitable building near the corner of L and Second streets, where it is desired that all the unprovided sick may be removed as early as possible. Let no one be neglected.

A trunk containing \$5000 in dust and a quantity of jewelry, was stolen from a house on Second street. A reward of \$1000 is advertised by the loser.

Bear meat is plenty in the Sacramento market.

The people of Sacramento are purifying their city. This is right, and we judge the same thing needed here and is being done, if we may judge by the offals and filth which have passed by our window for two days past.

The case of the State vs. Robinson, Caulfield and Packer, for murder, came on for trial. A petition was read from the prisoners for a change of venue, which was debated, and the court not being convinced, deferred the case for further argument and reserved its decision.

*Oversight.*—The Sacramento papers complain that the invitations sent abroad by the city, inviting everybody and his wife individually to come and unite in the celebration of the coming Tuesday, have made one exception—have not extended them to the state authorities. This, of course, was not intentional.

*Church robbed.*—Miss Sarah Church has been robbed of \$5000, supposed to have been done by two Englishmen.

Mr. D. Murry had his pocket picked of \$300, in the horse market. This is the way they do things up in Sacramento.

Mr. George Drew was robbed recently of \$3100 in Marysville. Two brothers named Darwin have been arrested, and are in the custody of the sheriff awaiting their trial.

SACRAMENTO COUNCIL.—On the occasion of the presentation of the report, &c, of the California Guard, the *Transcript* says in giving the remarks of the different members :

It afforded Dr. Spalding sincere pleasure that the Committee were present, as the press at San Francisco had misrepresented the matter.

We do not suppose that Alderman Spalding intended to misrepresent us, but he did so nevertheless by including us in his remark, as he will see if he will take the trouble to examine our files. It is as well to be exact in such matters.

MURDER AND RETALIATION.—The *Marysville Herald* gives an account of a murder of a man on the West Branch of Feather river, by the Indians. A party of some twenty men pursued them the next day and killed seven or eight Indians including two or three squaws. Some of the miners are leaving Butte Creek in consequence of the Indian depredations.

The masons and odd fellows of Sacramento have run themselves in debt \$14,425 44, besides \$17,010 10 paid including city bonds, in providing a place for the sick and taking care of them. They now ask the cooperation of the citizens at large, and the brethren of the orders, to come to their relief. We think their request should and will be met generously.

*Superintendent of Public Instruction.*—One of the two papers, either the *Alta* or the *Transcript*, has got to die hard on the question as to whether Nooney or Marvin is to be the successful candidate.
