We are in possession of advices from Coloma up to November 6th. They contain nothing later than what we published yesterday, except that after the five hour skirmish additional forces were raised at Placerville and Weberville, sufficient, no doubt, to succeed in driving the Indians into the mountains. After the news arrived at Coloma of the engagement in which Col. McKinney was mortally wounded, Dr, Tayloe, an efficient surgeon, with several others, started for McKinney's camp to render all possible assistance.

CAPTURE OF SLAVERS.—The bark Maria Mattison, which had arrived at New York from Canton, via St. Helena, reports the arrival at the latter port, on the 15th of August, of three Brazilian slavers with 700 slaves on board, captured by a British man-of war.

WILLIAMSBURG.—A movement is on foot to procure a city charter for Williamsburg, opposite New York.

DISUNION—THE SOUTH.—A meeting has been held in Alabama calling on Gov. Collier to convene the Legislature, relative to the admission of California. Gov. Quitman has called the Mississippi Legislature together on a similar appeal. The Georgia papers generally favor disunion, though

papers generally favor disunion, though the most able and influential stick to the Union. Toombs is at home addressing his constituents.



Brocchus of Ala., and Zerubable Snow of Ohio. as Associate Judges; Joseph L. Haywood of Utah, Marshal; Seth Blair of Texas. District Attorney. A majority of these are said to be Mormons. I have sent you their names, from time to time, by telegraph, in advance of every other paper. I think they may be relied on as correctly indicated.”

By special telegraphic correspondence to the New York Herald, we perceive that the above named gentlemen were nominated on the 26th September.
