Indian Troubles --- 15 Americans Killed.

We take the following from the Stockton Journal of Wednesday:

"Indian Hostilities! Fifteen Men

"INDIAN HOSTILITIES! FIFTEEN MEN MURDERED!!—We have just learned, as we are going to press, that a collision has taken place between the Americans and Indians at Moquelema Hill, or in the vicinity, in which fifteen Americans were killed, and the same, or perhaps a larger number of Indians fell. The gentleman who informed us had just arrived in Stockton, but was so much excited, probably from passing unscathed from the field of blood, that we could only learn the above.

"These are probably Indians who have been driven from the Upper Sacramento region by the volunteer force under Col. Rogers, which went out to chastise them for their numerous depredations in those quarters; but if they expect, by fleeing south, to find a more congenial field to carry on their work of robbery and murder in, they will find themselves most woefully mistaken."

From this it appears that trouble is brewing among the Indians, and we greatly fear that during this entire season we shall be frequently called upon to make similar records.
