INDIAN POWWOW.—We learn from the Marysville Herald that the neighboring Digger tribes are now celebrating a holiday season near Yuba City. Two hundred Indians have assembled—all of them tricked out in the finery of beads and feathers, and with but little else to restrict the free use of their limbs, or to absorb the perspiration of their bodies. The squaws are, in a few instances, provided with skirts, but all possessed girdles and necklaces of beads, with fancy head dress arrangements. The entertainments proved of a very satisfactory character to the "pale faces" in attendance.

IRISH EMIGRATION —A recent number of the Waterford Chronicle states that two hundred emigrants sailed from that port on that day, besides "a large number" on the previous day. The "Exodus" of the Irish population continue in full vigor, notwithstanding that winter has set in. Heretofore there was no emigration to speak of during the winter months, but now summer or winter is all alike to those who have made up their minds to fly from our shores. Heretofore the priests have opposed the emigration, but now so large a portion of their congregation are on the other side of the water that they too are attracted to the new country.
